Broccoli Casserole

Ingredients

- 2 (10-12 oz) boxes of frozen chopped broccoli
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 2 cans conc. cream of mushroom soup
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 1 cup grated jack or mozzarella cheese
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 30 crumbled Ritz Crackers
- ½ cup (1 stick) butter, melted

Preparation

- > Combine first 6 ingredients in casserole
- > Top with combined crackers and butter
- Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

Spinach Cheddar Quiche

Ingredients

- 10 oz frozen chopped spinach
- 1 lb. pork sausage (Jimmy Dean is good)
- ½ cup milk
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 8 oz grated cheddar cheese
- 1 9-inch unbaked pie shell

Preparation

- > Thaw spinach and squeeze dry
- > Cook and drain sausage
- Mix together eggs and milk
- Layer ingredients into pie shell in this order: spinach, sausage, egg mixture, cheese
- ➤ Bake at 375° for about 45 minutes until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

Tip: Recipe can be tweaked with different meats, vegetables, half & half, spices, etc.

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER.

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Greetings Fellow Gardeners:

This month finds us once again trying to keep our gardens watered without waste or punitive water rates. This is a good time to troubleshoot sprinklers and drip systems. Check for clogged drip emitters and malfunctioning sprinkler heads. Even highly drought tolerant trees like pines and Crepe Myrtles can use a good deep soaking once or twice a month.

August and September are hot and dry and new planting is inadvisable. However, here are some fun horticulture related projects to pursue. Try potting container plants. Remember though, plants, growing in dark colored pots heat up quickly in the sun and require frequent attention. Place plants into plastic containers and that will conserve water and encourage better root formation. The plastic pot may be placed into a decorative one and it will now require less attention.

Water holding basins around trees and on banks can degrade over time. Check them and rebuild if necessary. Refrain from fertilizing deciduous fruit trees this month. Although often advised by national gardening publications, this practice is inadvisable in our region as it is difficult to induce dormancy which is required for best fruit production

Roses are somewhat dormant in hot weather. They are conserving their energy for a burst of color in the fall. Perennials such as Anigozan thus (Kangaroo Paw), Agapanthus and Hemerocallis (Daylilies) require grooming of dead stalks. This is a good time to divide perennials such as Asparagus meyeri (Foxtail Asparagus), Iris, and Daylilies. Overgrown clumps of ornamental grasses like Pennisetum may be divided now. Divisions can be planted into another garden or given as gifts to gardening friends. In small gardens, this is a good way to make room for new plants. Simply dig up clumps and using a small garden saw, cut roots into manageable sizes and replant. "Water in" well to settle the roots.

Watch for signs of disease on established plants. This includes roses, some deciduous fruit trees and a LOT of other garden specimens. They are susceptible to fire blight which blackens and seems to scorch new growth. If symptoms are detected, prune infected branches and do not compost them. Oleanders are also susceptible to a very serious disease called Leaf Scorch (Xylella) a small insect which also infests Crepe Myrtles, Boston lvy, (Parthenoccisus), Grape Vines and Periwinkle Vine (Vinca major) and kills them. For this reason, Oleanders (Nerium oleander) should never be planted near these plants. This does not apply to the "Yellow Oleander (Thevetia) which is not an Oleander at all.


Interesting Fact

Hummingbirds can see colors that humans can't.

Colorblindness is relative. Just as we can perceive hues that dogs can't, hummingbirds can see colors that humans can't. Whereas the three types of color-sensitive cone cells in our eyes allow us to see red, green, and blue light, hummingbirds (and most other birds) have a fourth type of cone attuned to ultraviolet light. In addition to UV light, birds may even be able to see combination colors like ultraviolet+green and ultraviolet+red – something we mere humans can only imagine. Having four types of cones cells, known as tetrachromacy, is also common in fish and reptiles, and researchers believe that dinosaurs possessed it as well. Some very special humans also seem to have a fourth type of cone – about 1% of the population.

Being able to see this way is especially useful for hummingbirds, whose endless quest for sugar is aided by their ability to discern different-colored flowers – including "nonspectral" colors that combine hues from widely different parts of the color spectrum. Purple is the only nonspectral color we humans can perceive (it involves both blue and red, or both short and long wavelengths of light), but some birds might see as many as five: purple, ultraviolet+red, ultraviolet+green, ultraviolet+yellow and ultraviolet+purple. That certainly sounds worth singing about.

Another fact about hummingbirds: they are the only birds that can fly backward.

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






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
