THE GARDENER'S CORNER

From the gardener's corner...If your garden looks anything like mine, it's a disaster. As tempted as you may be to clean things up by chopping off all the dead branches and leaves, please don't do it. Pruning only endangers

what's left of the plant underground. Leave everything as is until late March and by then you will know which plants have survived. Please keep your watering schedule and dig in compost where you can. This is the last month to plant bare root fruit and nut trees, berries, grapes, vines and roses. It's a good time to plant strawberries. To brighten things up plant some pansies in a sunny spot. Feed your established deciduous fruit trees about three weeks before you expect them to bloom. Apply the last dormant spray just before blooms begin to swell. Also, fertilize roses, perennials and cane berries. Spread some pre-weeder seeder (granular). It controls crabgrass, other annual grasses and broadleaf weeds.

Cheer up everyone—Groundhog Day marks the halfway point to Spring! Happy Digging in the Dirt!



On Christmas, around 8:15 p.m., we had a fire in our garage that pretty much destroyed everything there. Fortunately, the firewalls held exceptionally well and we had no actual fire within our home. From the preliminary findings as to a "cause," the insulation wrap installed on the outside of the water heater seems to be the culprit. Over 5+ years it accumulated enough dust/dirt within the insulation to fuel an ignition. This ordinarily would not have happened, but the insulation wrap was installed too low and there was air

restriction that compounded the problem. Yes, there was a cracked burner plate, but it is not felt to be causative. The fire inspector commented on how well Ryland built the garage....it may have saved the whole house.

Having said all of that.....my wife and I have been overwhelmed by the outreach from our Mountain View neighbors. I would never have believed, in this day and age, that so many people would come together to show the degree of kindness and support extended to our family. A "thank you" seems so trivial compared to your support, but we sincerely extend our gratitude to each and every one of you. SWEETHEARTS' MOUSSE FOR TWO

2 oz semi-sweet chocolate

2 TBS water

2 egg yolks

2 egg whites, beaten to stiff peaks

1/4 cup sugar

Heat chocolate and water in the top of a double boiler over barely simmering water or in the microwave until melted. Stir until blended and set aside to cool. Beat the egg yolks and sugar until pale and creamy. Beat in chocolate until well blended. Fold egg whites into the chocolate mixture. Pour this mousse into your most glamorous stemware. Chill several hours or overnight.

If desired, gently stir any one of these options into the mousse:

1 TBS orange flavored liquor

1 TBS rum

1 tsp vanilla extract


