Hello everyone! Let's get to it!

Homeowners have been asking why TGIF was cancelled in January and why the HOA Board meeting changed from in person to Zoom. Here is what we know from COVID-19 studies, why TGIF cancelled and the Board meeting changed to Zoom.

The Omicron virus is far more contagious than the original COVID-19 and has spread with dizzying speed! It can spread easily by someone even if they have been vaccinated or do not have symptoms.

The HOA Board has always followed the state of California's COVID-19 guidelines (COVID-19.ca.gov) which coincide with CDC recommendations and guidelines. We therefore continue to advocate for masks to be worn at all indoor events (except when eating), regardless of vaccination status. (2022, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, COVID-19 Guidelines.) However, due to the highly contagious nature of the Omicron variant, and HOA board member's health concerns, the decision was made to hold the HOA meeting via Zoom. The board MUST have a quorum to have a meeting and if three board members are absent (as was the case here), there can be no meeting. As we have all along, we will continue to reevaluate the COVID situation on a month-to-month basis.

TGIF was cancelled by the committee responsible for the event. They have indicated they will decide whether to hold TGIF on a month-to-month basis.

Our annual election meeting was held on Wednesday, January 26, 2022. Our thanks to Judy Box, Grace Paltikian and Gretchen Williams for counting the ballots. Here are the election results and the board position each will hold:

The board is aware there are issues with the ballots. The instructions are confusing and difficult to follow. So much so, homeowners just toss their ballot rather than struggle with it. If the directions are not followed to the letter, the ballot will not count. We are going to look at viable solutions to make the process less frustrating and the directions easier to follow. Something Lovin' from the Oven

Melt your Valentines' hearts with this mocha chocolate cheese cake with a chocolate glaze.

Mocha Chocolate Cheesecake

Ingredients

Crust:

1 cup cookie crumbs (chocolate or vanilla) 2 Tbsp butter, melted

Filling:

3 8-oz pkgs cream cheese, softened

½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup brown sugar

1 cup (8 oz) sour cream

3 eggs, large

11/4 cups (7 oz) chocolate chips, melted

½ cup coffee (freshly brewed)

1 Tbsp vanilla extract

Glaze:

3/4 cup (5 oz) chocolate chips

1/4 cup butter, softened

Preparation

- > Preheat oven to 350°.
- Crush cookies to measure 1 cup.
- Combine with melted butter and press into 9-inch springform pan. Refrigerate.
- Put cream cheese in mixer bowl.
- > Beat on medium speed until very smooth.
- > Add sugars & sour cream. Blend thoroughly.
- Add eggs and beat until smooth.
- > Blend in chocolate, coffee, and vanilla.
- > Pour into prepared crust. Bake 50-60 min.
- > Turn off oven. Crack oven door 1 inch.
- ➤ Leave cake in oven for 1 hour.
- > Remove. Cool to room temperature.
- Glaze: Melt chocolate & butter on low heat.
- Stir until smooth. Spread on cheesecake.
- Refrigerate 3-4 hours. Loosen sides of pan with a thin knife and remove from cake.

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER.

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Hello, fellow gardeners!

Feed cool-season annuals regularly. Watch for snails and slugs, especially if the weather is wet and mild. Eliminate insect hideouts by cleaning up piles of leaves and garden debris. Hoe or pull out weeds before they overtake planting beds.

Wait! Wait a while yet to prune back frost damage. Wait to replace or introduce new tropical plants. And, wait another month before feeding most plants.

Plant bare root fruit and citrus trees. They will benefit from rain (if we ever get any more). If planting subtropicals (like citrus) make sure to think about frost protection. Leave room between the trees and sink a 1"x1" piece of wood into the ground on all four sides. This allows you to drape frost cloth around them. Cover at night and uncover in the morning.

Feed Azaleas with a high phosphorus fertilizer now and until they are finished blooming. Argentine Army Ants carry and spread disease. Signs are blemishes on fruit, curling leaves and/or a cottony, white undergrowth. Keep trees showered and clean to discourage ants. If branches touch the ground, prune higher to make it more difficult for ants to ascend the trees. Consider wrapping the lower trunk with quilt batting (from a fabric store), cover snugly with plastic wrap and apply an ant adhesive, such as "Tree Tanglefoot".

Fertilize citrus trees with Nitrogen. The amount of fertilizer you use will vary according to the age and size of the tree. Do a little research if you're not sure. Water the tree the day before, spread the fertilizer over the root zone and water well. Citrus feeder roots are very close to the surface so, do not over fertilize.

Dusty plants are a haven for red spider mites, wooly whiteflies, and mealybugs. If plants are already infested with any or all of these pests, spray with soapy water made from 1 or 2 Tbs. of liquid dishwashing detergent per gallon of water. A Tbsp. of vegetable oil added to this mix will also smother unhatched eggs. Spray plant thoroughly making certain all sides of each leaf are washed and soaped. Repeat the process as often as necessary.

Homemade bait stations to control ants may be made from a simple formula of ½ tsp. boric acid, 3 tbs. sugar and I cup of water. Mix thoroughly and pour into a small, clean glass jar with a lid. Use a nail to create a hole in the lid through which ants can enter. Place jar on its side, on the ground slightly nested into the soil for stability. This mixture is dangerous to pets and children, so use with caution. This is very effective as ants will carry it back to their underground chambers and share it with the entire colony.


Flip Tops for Ronald McDonald House

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


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
