Happy New Year everyone! We are looking forward to happy and prosperous 2023.

Not much to write about this month as the board meeting isn't until later in the month, Wednesday, January 25. Please keep in mind that is the date of our **Annual Board Election**. Please remember to vote! **If there are not enough homeowners voting, there will not be a quorum and an election could not be held.** A “quorum” for our community is 25% of the membership or 64 homes out of 255 total members. Annual meetings that do not achieve quorum are rescheduled to a future date. If that occurs, it will cost the association money!

Please Note; there are three candidates running for two board positions, Sharol Lewis, Gretchen Williams, and Pat Bailey. Be sure to check out all three candidate statements in your ballot materials. **Sharol Lewis' and Pat Bailey's statements are located on the front and back of the same page.**

In past years we have barely made quorum so please vote! **Follow the ballot directions exactly.** Be sure you fill out the information at the top- left of the white envelope. The ballot will not be counted if the white envelope is not filled out properly. Every year several ballots are disqualified because the homeowners did not fill out this information.

Debit card scams. Here is how it works: you get a call with the caller ID of your bank. The caller states he is from the Fraud Department calling about your debit card ending---- (the last four-digit numbers of your card). He will ask if you have been traveling and reports two suspicious charges from out-of-state stores (typically Lowe's and Walmart).

He advises the bank will send a new debit card and verifies your address and phone number that he already has! He will then send a verification code to your cell and requests you read it to him. At that point, he will ask for your PIN number so he can “deactivate the number”. If you say “no” he will then ask you to look at the phone number, he is calling from. It will match the phone number on the back of your debit card! At that point, HANG UP and call your bank immediately. They will cancel your card immediately and issue a new one. Remember, Banks will never ask for your PIN number!

Be aware folks. These scammers are smart and good at what they do. They prey on the elderly. Never, never give out information such as the above. Be suspicious and call your bank!

Something Lovin' from the Oven

This delicious Bread Pudding Recipe comes to us by popular demand from our neighbor, **Judy Box**. I added some sauces to go with it.

Bread Pudding

Ingredients

4 beaten eggs	1/2 tsp vanilla extract
2 cups milk	3 cups dry bread cubes
1/3 cup sugar	1/3 cup raisins
1/2 tsp cinnamon	

Preparation

- Beat together: eggs, milk, sugar, cinnamon, and vanilla
- Place bread cubes in a baking dish.
- Sprinkle with raisins.
- Pour egg mixture over all.
- Bake at 350° for 35 to 45 minutes, until a knife inserted in center comes out clean.
- Cool slightly. Serve warm.
- If desired, serve with lemon sauce or whiskey sauce. Makes 6 servings.

Lemon Sauce

Ingredients

1/2 cup sugar	1 cup boiling water
1 Tbs cornstarch	1 Tbs butter
1/8 tsp salt	1/4 cup lemon juice

Preparation

- Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt in a sauce pan.
- Gradually add water and simmer over low heat until thick, stirring occasionally.
- Remove from heat. Stir in butter and juice.

Whiskey Sauce

Ingredients

1/2 cup sugar	1/2 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup butter	1/4 cup whiskey

Preparation

Combine all ingredients and warm over low heat to just below a boil.

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Hello fellow gardeners!

January is Southern California's first month of Spring. One can expect to see Quince, blooming Almond, Flowering Pear, early Daffodils and Crocus flowers.

From a plant's point of view, we have no real winter here. Temperatures which seem really cold to us are perfectly comfortable for the vast majority of our plants. They will bloom throughout the winter if given even the smallest encouragement.

Bare-root roses are appearing in garden centers, even though the roses in our gardens are still in flower. For the best health of your roses, encourage them to go dormant for a few weeks. The rest is important to their longevity, resulting in more perfect and larger flowers. Cut back roses hard this month. When pruning, consider the proper shaping of plants. Eliminate all weak or dead growth and crossing branches. Strip off and dispose of all remaining leaves. Leaves left on the plant may result in disease and insects. Examine plant canes and you may see tiny green swellings of dormant leaf buds. Make cuts just above one of these buds and always choose an outward facing bud. This will encourage roses to develop a pleasing shape. After replanting, they will begin producing new growth. Remember, Hybrid Tea roses bloom only on new wood and without regular pruning they will not continue to produce.

Besides roses, garden centers are also offering bare-root fruit trees. Dwarf selections are ideal for small yards. They bear fruit, are easier to harvest, and are a good size for small gardens.

Flowering peaches have lovely flowers and are closely related to double roses.

If you haven't been successful getting winter color planted before Christmas, it's still not too late. Primroses have stunning color and love cold weather. This also applies to Violas, Iceland Poppies, Calendula, Sweet Alyssum, Calibrachoa, and most other winter flowering annuals and perennials.

Continue to bait for snails if necessary. Watch for gophers which are more active in winter and spring. Garden centers offer traps, baits and gas bombs to deal with them. They can be very difficult to eliminate.

New garden catalogs are published this month. It's also a good time to start fun seeds such as mixed cacti. They are easy to grow and there's often a surprise in each packet

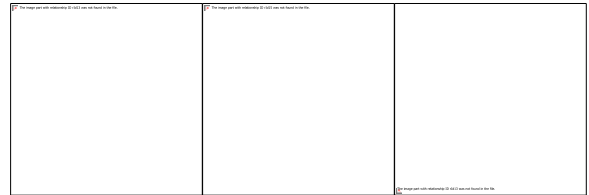
