Board Comments:

Homeowner Forum – Agenda Items: No requests.

Consent Calendar - Approved

New Business:

<u>2023-2024 Draft Budget</u>: Board of Directors reviewed the draft budget and expressed concerns for the proposed increase in homeowner assessments. A meeting with the Finance Committee will be scheduled to discuss and finalize the budget.

Proposed ARC Revisions: Processing Fee and Projects That Do Not Need to Be Submitted with A Fee: The ARC application processing fee has risen from \$50 to \$95. To offset some of the cost, the board has approved an ARC list of projects that will not require a fee. Each of these projects will still require an application. Homeowners will receive a letter regarding the changes.

<u>Landscape Proposals: Replace Plants at Mammoth and Fireplace Area, Remove Sago Plant at Pool Gate Entry:</u> Board approved a motion to replace several plants, remove the Sago plant at the pool gate entry and replace it with a large boulder/rock. Total Cost: \$1,880.00.

<u>Gate Operator Proposals</u>: The Board reviewed proposals to replace the swing operators on the Cactus and JFK gates. After reviewing the cost and a follow-up discussion, the project was delayed until next year.

<u>Lock For Ping-Pong Table</u>: The Ping Pong table is now located on the cement area behind the BBQs. It has a padlock. **All you need to unlock it is your community gate key**.

<u>Homeowner Forum – Items Not on Current Agenda</u>: Comment regarding renters attending board meetings. The board has consulted with legal counsel and reviewed the issue multiple times. Only homeowners who appear on a legal deed may attend HOA board meetings.

Social Club Committee: As Sharol mentioned in her article this month, elections for Social Club Chair and Vice Chair will be held in June. If there are no volunteers, here is what will happen. The board has agreed that no outside entity will be paid to oversee the Social Club. If no one on the committee steps up and there are no other volunteers, all Social Club planned events will be shut down effective July 1, 2023. TGIF, and all other scheduled events will be cancelled until a new Chair and Vice Chair are elected. For the time being, clubs will be allowed to continue. Social Club meetings will still be held the second Thursday of every month chaired by either the secretary, treasurer or Board Liaison. The Social Club needs a leader and co-leader. As of April 30, 2023 there is a total of \$4,409.00 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.44%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.57% on March 31, 2023.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

ARC:

The ARC committee had three new applications. Residents need to complete the <u>application of completion</u> once the project has been completed. As of <u>August 1, 2023 a nonrefundable application fee of \$95.00</u> is required for each Home Improvement Form filed with the Management Company.

There are many home projects that <u>must be</u> submitted to the ARC for approval, but no fee will be required.

COMMUNICATIONS:

The colored pictures in the outside bulletin board are printed at Office Max. After being displayed for a month, the pictures will be put in a photo album that will be kept in the clubhouse. 14 community emails went out.

There was \$160.00 in ad revenue last month. The total cost of office supplies for the fiscal year is \$2,472.00.

A new community directory will be this August. A form is in this June newsletter for residents to fill out for the directory.



Something Lovin' from the Oven

I made these tarts for last month's Ladies Afternoon Tea Party



Pecan Tarts

Ingredients

Dough for two single pie crusts

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 5 Tbsp dark corn syrup or maple syrup
- 3 Tbsp butter, melted
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup pecans, chopped

Preparation

- Preheat oven to 325°.
- > Lightly grease medium size muffin pan.
- > Roll out pastry a little thinner than usual.
- Cut 12 5-inch circles and fit into muffin cups.
 (6 circles are made from each crust, re-rolling scraps as needed)
- Melt butter. Add sugar, syrup, and vanilla.
- > Beat eggs and combine into mixture.
- > Stir in chopped pecans.
- Spoon into pastry lined muffin cups, filling each cup no more than ³/₄ full. Overfilling will cause cups to overflow in oven.
- Bake for 30-35 minutes until pastry is golden brown and filling is set.
- Use 2 forks to remove tarts from cups.

Note: If you have extra filling, you can bake it without a crust in ovenproof custard cups, ramekins, or another muffin pan.

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Greetings Green Thumbers!

June is typically mild with cloudy mornings and moderately warm temperatures but can end with triple digit temperatures. Perennials are in bloom. One of my favorites is Alstromeria, a spotted and striped lily-like plant with blossoms available in all colors but blue. They are tough and if planted in shade, will bloom all summer long returning year after year. Marigolds, Dwarf Sunflowers, Daylilies, Vinca, Impatiens, Campanula, Verbena, Gaillardia and Rudbeckia are also available.

This is a great time to add drought resistant plants like succulents and Cacti. Because of strict California water policies, plant breeders have been working with plants such as Agaves ("Century Plants"). Lovely dwarf varieties (2 feet tall or less) include the striped Agave in green, yellow, grey and red, or Agave Americana which is urn shaped and variegated brightly with gold leaves edged with dark green. Another colorful and easy succulent plant is Aeonium "Kiwi," with beautiful rosettes in a kaleidoscope of colors.

It is safe to add palms, tree ferns, bananas, Lantana, Bougainvillea, Mandevilla, and Plumeria. Know that not all plants offered in garden centers are right for our climate. If you are unsure about a plant, do a little Internet research to check it out.

Melons, eggplant, peppers, and other fruiting vegetables can also be planted. Pick zucchini and other summer squash when still small and tender. Larger fruits can become woody and seedy. Clip runners off strawberries to encourage larger fruit. Continue to cut and deadhead roses and pinch back Chrysanthemums to encourage a fuller, bushier plant. Divide and repot root bound plants. Divide bearded Irises if necessary. Remove spent flowers from Daylilies. Trim back overgrown herbs but avoid pruning back into hard wood with Rosemary, Thyme and Lavender. They will not produce new growth from hard wood.

Keeping Gardenias in bloom may be a challenge. They should be kept moist and fed monthly with Camellia and Azalea Food. They require additional iron periodically to prevent yellowing leaves and leaf and bud drop. Gardenias planted near houses may not bloom as they require colder night temperatures. Plant them under the open sky away from block walls and houses.

Interesting Facts

Architecture was once an Olympic event.

Can you picture an Olympic hopeful waking up at the crack of dawn to spend hours hunched over a drafting table, perfecting their blueprints? Thanks to International Olympic Committee co-founder Pierre de Coubertin, the concept became a reality when the IOC began awarding medals in the categories of sports-related architecture, music, literature, painting and sculpture at the 1912 Stockholm Games.

The first gold medal in architecture went to the Swiss team of Eugene-Edouard Monod and Alphonse Laverriere for their "Building Plan of a Modern Stadium." By 1928, the architecture competition had been divided into the subcategories of town planning and design, with the Netherlands' Jan Wils winning gold in the latter for his still standing Olympic Stadium Amsterdam. However, the subjective process of selecting artistic champions ultimately produced some questionable results. Sometimes, finicky judges refused to award gold (or silver or bronze) medals when the quality of submissions failed to meet their lofty standards. Other times, such as during the 1936 Berlin Games, the host country's creative teams tallied a suspiciously disproportionate share of winning hardware.

Artistic competitions remained part of the Olympics following a hiatus for World War II, with Austria's Adolf Hoch and Finland's Yrjo Lindegren claiming architecture gold in 1948. However, the writing was on the wall for these Jim Thorpes of the compass and T-square as new IOC President Avery Brundage (who started in 1952) strongly discouraged the proliferation of professionals in the amateur realm. The creative arts were permanently relegated to the sideshow of Olympic exhibitions in 1952, and the hard-earned efforts of champion builders, singers, and writers from the first half of the 20th century were banished to obscurity when their medals were stricken from the Olympic record books.

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
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
