DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of Jan. 31, 2019, there is a total of \$6,611.84 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.85%, which is unchanged from Dec. 31, 2018.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Finance: Asked for and got Board approval for money market account at 2.6% - 2.65%.

Social: 3/29 - Clubhouse open house will replace TGIF and will require reservations. April and May will have TGIF. 5/15 - Discovery Luncheon and Fashion Show. 5/26 – Memorial Day party. 6/29 or 6/30 – Independence Day Party.

Architectural (ARC): Two houses will be painted soon using the newly approved colors.

New Business

Reserve Study Proposals - The Board approved the proposal from Advanced Reserve Solutions, Inc., for a reserve study update at a cost of \$475.00 funded from reserves.

Pine Tree Removal Proposal - The Board approved the proposal from Artistic Maintenance to remove four pine trees and stump grind three of them at a cost pf \$2400.00 funded from reserves. The trees are behind the tennis court and pool areas.

Acacia Replacement Proposal - The Board approved the proposal from Artistic Maintenance to remove the tops of old Acacia from selected slopes that face the golf course and replace them with 270 five-gallon low growing Acacias at a cost of \$10350.00 funded from reserves.

Proposed Rule Change – The Board agreed to draft a change to the Rules and Regulations to require that dogs be kept on a leash when outside in common areas. The revision will be reviewed at the next meeting.

Clubhouse Renovation Update

Renovation Committee: Gretchen Williams, Sue Sloan and Eunice Kang

<u>Clubhouse Closure</u> – Much of the construction work is finished and we are opening the clubhouse on Feb. 27 for the HOA Meeting only. The clubhouse will be closed for completion of construction and wall painting until approximately March 15.

<u>Flooring</u> - Harold White Tile Works laid durable carpeting in the billiard's room and beautiful porcelain plank tiles in the rest of the clubhouse. They installed double doors with tempered glass inserts which can be removed in case of breakage, between the main and billiard's rooms.

<u>Bar and Refrigerator Niche</u> – Steven's Home Improvement converted the Social Club closet into a refrigerator niche and smaller walk-in closet. He installed the bar cabinets and plumbing for water inflow and drainage. He also installed electrical outlets and a hanging bar light. When the counter top is in, he will install the sink.

<u>Entertainment Center</u> – Steven built a platform and installed the cabinets above it. He installed four ceiling speakers and a wall outlet. We will ask Miguel, of M Art Custom Wood Design, to install baseboards and construct an equipment shelf. Steven will mount the TV and connect the equipment after the walls are painted.

Small Cabinet – Steven installed this cabinet in the main room to contain our large waste baskets.

<u>Counter Tops</u> – Templates have been made and quartz counter tops are being manufactured for the bar, entertainment center, and small cabinet. They will be ready for installation around 3/11.

<u>Library/Office</u> – Miguel, of M Art, is building a custom unit comprised of desk, file drawers, keyboard drawer, open shelves, and cabinets for computer, printer, and storage. He will install this on 2/25.

<u>Other Wood Work</u> - Miguel is refinishing our two bistro tables. He will install locks on all the new cabinets of the Library/Office, Bar, and Entertainment Center. We will ask him to do some repair and touchup to the woodwork in the billiard's room as well.

<u>Restrooms</u> – We purchased new lights and are ordering a new cabinet for the ladies' room. We will also buy new lights for the men's room.

<u>Tables and Chairs</u> - 7 tables and 28 chairs have been ordered. The chairs may not arrive until late in April. Table tops and bases will arrive soon. Steven will put them together. The tables are similar to our old ones in structure and material but not color. Also, three of the tables will have square tops.

<u>Accent Chairs</u> – We have selected leather barrel chairs and ordered material swatches in order to decide on the colors. We will purchase five for the bar room and two for the front door area.

<u>Side Tables, Library Chair, Window Treatments, Wall Art, and Microwave</u> Oven have not yet been chosen. **Broom Closet** solution is being researched.

<u>Grand Opening Celebration</u> - There will be a Clubhouse Grand Opening celebration in place of our normal TGIF this month. The celebration will be held on Friday, March 29, 2019 at 5:30pm.

Rattle Those Pots and Pans

From The Kitchen of Katie Wenke

FISH CHOWDER

1 ½ cups and ¼ cup cold water, divided use 1 small red potato (about 4 ounces) cut into 1-inch cubes

½ small yellow onion, finely chopped 1 medium carrot, cut into ½ inch slices ½ medium rib of celery, cut into ½ inch slices

- 2 flounder or other thin, mild fish filets (about 4 ounces each), rinsed and patted dry and cut into bite size pieces
- 1 (5 ounce) can fat-free evaporated milk
- 1 TBS snipped fresh parsley
- ½ tsp dried thyme, crumbled
- 1/8 tsp cayenne
- 1/8 tsp salt
- 2 tsp cornstarch
- ➤ In a medium covered saucepan, bring 1 ½ cups water, potato, onion, carrots and celery to a boil for 8-10 minutes or until vegetables are tender-crisp.
- Add fish and cook covered for 1-2 minutes or until fish flakes easily.
- Stir in milk, parsley, thyme, cayenne and salt.
- Increase heat to medium low and cook for 1-2minutes or until milk is hot

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk together the cornstarch and remaining ¼ cup water until smooth.

Stir into hot soup and cook for about 1 minute, or until the soup has thickened slightly, stirring frequently



The Green Thumb Corner

Greetings, fellow gardeners,

March is a busy time in our gardens. Spring is officially here, regardless of the date on the calendar. The increasing daylight and warm sun are now inducing new growth everywhere one looks.

March is one of the months in which Southern California gardens grow the fastest and this acceleration means that our beloved flora, particularly our lawns, will require supplemental feeding.

Lawns will benefit most from a balanced high nitrogen fertilizer which includes iron. If your turf still appears vellow two weeks after applying fertilizer, consider applying additional supplemental iron. Never apply fertilizer to lawns when the temperature is above eighty degrees. If you do choose to apply fertilizer during the higher temperatures, you should also increase the volume of water you apply to the lawn for one or two weeks. This will give your lawn a good start and prevent possible burning.

This is also a good time to apply a broad leaf weed killer to the lawn to control such weedy pests as crabgrass, dandelions, and oxalis.

Remember to resist the temptation to prune back the parts of those tender tropical plants which sustained frost damage. It is much safer to prune these plants when new buds swell, then you can easily see what is dead and what is not. Additionally, frost is still possible through the month of March, though unlikely, and the dead growth protects the healthy growth from further frost damage.

An exception to the frost damage rule would be the leaves of ornamental grasses such as *Pennisetum* (Mexican Feather Grass) or *Miscanthus*. These plants may safely be trimmed down now to within two or three inches of the soil. If these are not cut back hard before new growth begins, your graceful ornamental grasses will look like haystacks with long dead thatch hopelessly enmeshed among the leaves.

March is a terrific month for planting. The weather is not too hot and your new plants would still have a few weeks to grow their roots deep enough to withstand the rigors of summer heat and drought.

Don't forget your garden wildlife. Nesting birds still require good sites for nests, so birdhouses and feeders should be clean and in place for the huge demands of nesting birds. Keep those hummingbird feeders filled as birds choose nesting sites based on the availability of food for their chicks.

Here is the first question from one of our neighborhood gardeners.

Hello Victoria.

Our flower garden at the rear of our house, has green moss growing in spots throughout the year. We turn the ground under two or three times during the year, but the moss just seems to come back. What can I use to remove the moss and not harm my plants? Thank you,

Trying to get rid of moss.

Hi Trying to get rid of moss,

Due to the excessive rain we have experienced this vear, moss and toad stools may be a problem. Moss loves to grow in poor conditions and will thrive where other plants struggle, taking over their space. It will appear in areas of compacted soil, poor drainage, low fertility, insufficient light, extremes of pH level, and where grass has been cut too close.

To prevent moss, the conditions that allow moss to flourish must be addressed. Thin trees and bushes to permit more sunlight. Do not over water. If possible, cultivate the mossy spots with a hoe or garden fork and add compost, such as ©Kellog's, ©Miracle Grow, or ©Vigoro and mix in well. Adding gypsum (available in garden centers, Lowe's, or Home Depot) will reduce acidity in soil as well.

Remember, gardening is supposed to be a pleasure, not a burden, so adapt your garden style to your lifestyle, and have fun just being outdoors in the fresh air. Gardening can be as much or as little exercise as one wishes it to be.
