Happy May everyone! I trust this finds you happy and in good health.

Well, if all goes well, last night's HOA ZOOM meeting may be our last virtual board meeting. It is our hope that we will be back in our clubhouse for the June meeting. I, for one, am looking so forward to seeing everyone in person and to be able to talk face-to-face. Let's keep our fingers crossed!

As many of you are aware, the board has finally been able to reopen community events. An email was sent to everyone explaining how it will work and the modifications all of us will need to follow. Let me recap that for anyone who did not read the email.

So, Riverside County dropped from COVID-19 tier Red to COVID-19 tier Orange. This meant Mountain View could begin opening common area facilities with restrictions. Face masks must still be worn when in a group, social distancing must be adhered to and the CDC still encourages rigorous hand washing/sanitizing.

Fobs have been reinstated for homeowners who have a Liability Waiver on file.

Please note: a maximum occupancy of 25% (or 20 individuals) is allowed into the clubhouse at one time. Any overflow must remain outside.

These clubs are resuming with restrictions (masks, as much distance as possible, sanitizing hands <u>and</u> tables after play. (Sanitizer and paper towels are provided). TGIF, BBQ usage, Bible Study, Bid Whist, Bingo, Bunco, Card Games, Craft Club, Dine Out, Dominos, Ladies' Luncheon, Ladies' Night at the Pool, Line Dancing, Morning Coffee, Pool Room (1 player or one household; maximum playtime 60 Minutes), swimming pool (maximum pool occupancy 10; maximum 60 minutes swim time).

GYM and SPA (1 homeowner or 1 family; maximum 60-minute workout.) Water Aerobics (maximum pool occupancy10.) Community Events (with restrictions - TBA.)

Parade Events (masks are strongly encouraged.)

Visitors may return for outside facility use only. They MUST have a signed Liability Waiver on file (contact Eunice Kang). It is the responsibility of the homeowner to ensure this occurs prior to the visit. Visitors need only one waiver on file. Maximum occupancy limits must be adhered to and visitors must follow mask restrictions and practice social distancing.

Most of you are aware that our Ping Pong table was stolen from the clubhouse area. The board would like to know how many of you would be interested in playing so we can decide whether to replace it. Please let Gretchen Williams or one of the board members know if you are interested.

I am looking for ladies who are interested in playing golf. We are thinking twice per month at Rancho Del Sol. That is the large course that wraps around our development. Playing 18 holes (unless we are lazy that day and wish only to play 9) and having lunch afterward. Or there is the option of playing Cottonwood, the Par 3 course off Frederick Street instead. We had a ladies group playing for years and it would be nice to see it reinstated again. If you are interested, please let me know. Pat Roy (951) 323-1998. DELINQUENCY STATUS REPORT:

As of March, 2021, there was a total of \$3,713 in delinquent assessments. This value represents an approximate delinquency rate of 1.04%, as compared to the last delinquency rate of 1.82% in February, 2021.

COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Finance: There were no issues upon review of the March financial statement.

Social: A community garage sale on May 22nd from 8 till noon. A \$5 yard sale sign is required. More info in the newsletter. There will be a Memorial Day parade on May 29th at 10 a.m. and will start at the clubhouse and go to the JFK gate. TGIF will be on May 28th starting at 5:30.

Architecture: There will be an ARC drive thru of the community during the week of May 17th. They will be noting homes that need repairs, painting, landscape issues etc.

Facilities: A cover at the Cactus gate for the opener is missing and needs replacement. Areas in the spa were sanded and look good. Water is pooling on the tennis court (left side) which will need to be fixed prior to resurfacing.

Landscape: No report

Communications: Newsletter revenue over cost is \$1,098 year to date. Non newsletter costs year-to-date were \$349. A great deal of work was done to the FOB system, including entries of former residents were removed or current resident added, and all resident addresses were added. Orange tier COVID restrictions were emailed to the community.

Neighborhood Watch: Speeding was addressed.

Clubhouse Renovation: The z-clips were installed, and that problem seems to be resolved. A subcommittee for obtaining wall art for the clubhouse will soon be getting color into the clubhouse, (my velvet Elvis did not make the cut).

New Business

Ping Pong Table Theft: The ping pong table was stolen, and replacement is on the next agenda.

Tennis Court Resurfacing: The tennis court will be resurfaced and restriped at a cost of \$6,020

HOMEOWNER FORUM (for non-agenda issues):

Speeding, especially by commercial delivery trucks was brought up by Mrs. Higgins. This can only be addressed if we have information like a truck number, license plate number or at least date and time.

The next Board meeting will be held on May 26, 2021 at 6:00 p.m., and will be virtual (hopefully the last one).

THE GREEN THUMB CORNER

Greetings Green Thumbers!

Although it is generally not advisable to put in plants prior to hot weather, it is the best time to plant subtropicals and tropicals. This month, garden centers are stocked with subtropical plants that come from the equator.

Plumerias are as drought tolerant as Cacti. They are closely related to Oleander and the flowers are very similar. Like Oleanders, these plants produce an irritating, allergen sap when pruned or cut. They are typically associated with Hawaii or tropical Asia but are native to Central America. Plumerias are most often grown in pots and sheltered indoors during winter. However, if kept reasonably dry in winter, they may be successfully grown in the ground.

Bougainvilleas are very popular. They are loved for their spectacular display of colorful bracts (the true flowers are small, white, and inconspicuously nestled within the colored bracts.) These plants are drought tolerant and fail to flower or flower poorly if given too much water. They thrive in heat and drought. Established plants do well with just a monthly soaking. There are now dozens of varieties suitable for small gardens and containers.

Mandevilla plants are in bloom now. These tropical vines are hardy, large flowered and come in a wide color range. This is a more restrained vine that seldom exceeds fifteen feet. If planted near a south facing wall or even close to a fence, it will usually survive frosts and bloom again in May. Flowers may exceed five inches in width and are typically velvety red, strawberry pink or white.

Passionflower vines are also available in many varieties. All are beautiful and many produce delicious fruit with a slightly perfume-like flavor.

Continue to fertilize turf areas monthly through summer. Don't forget to troubleshoot your sprinkler and drip systems. Don't wait until you have brown spots to discover you have a problem.

Camellias and Azaleas may now be pruned to correct for size or shape. Most summer flowering shrubs bloom continuously on new wood. They may be pruned any time during their growing season to improve their appearance or for using as cut flowers. When cutting blooms for use in the house, check your plants for pests and signs of disease.

It is not too late to plant summer vegetables. Add tomatoes, squash and peppers. Leafy vegetables however, prefer a fall planting.

Fresh Strawberries are now in the market at a reasonable price. It's time to enjoy your favorite Strawberry Shortcake or this unusual but delicious alternative:

French Strawberry Cake

Ingredients

1¼ cup sugar, divided

1 stick unsalted butter at room temperature

2 large eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract

1⅓ cups flour

11/4 tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

½ cup sour cream

1 lb. strawberries, stemmed and halved

Preparation

- Preheat oven to 350°.
- Spray a 9-inch cake pan with cooking spray.
- ➤ Beat together butter and 1 cup sugar until pale and fluffy, 5-7 minutes.
- > Add eggs, beating well after each egg.
- Beat in vanilla extract.
- Whisk together flour, baking powder, and salt.
- Add to butter mixture alternately with sour cream, beating just enough to combine.
- > Fold in strawberries. Spread batter into pan.
- Sprinkle with remaining ¼ cup sugar.
- > Bake 40-50 minutes until done.
- > Cool completely on rack. Turn out onto plate.
- Serve with additional fresh sweetened strawberries.

"Oh, they'll be fine in a minute. We were just on route 119."





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
