# "THE VIEW" November 2021

Hello everyone! I trust this newsletter finds you in good health and staying busy.

As most of you are aware, our community had confirmed cases of COVID-19 in October with additional exposures via our social clubs. At this writing, it appears that everyone is on the mend with the exception of one hospitalization. *It is for this reason the board has closed down the clubhouse to all activities until it is deemed safe to reopen.* We know this is a wildly unpopular decision but necessary to help stop the spread of the disease. If you think you may have been exposed or are feeling ill, remain at home, contact your doctor and get tested. The best way to protect yourself and others is to wear a mask at all indoor gatherings, wash your hands frequently, keep your distance and if possible, get vaccinated. The board will keep you updated via community email regarding the reopening date.

Many of us use the *Letters to the Editor* column in our newsletter and here are the rules established by the HOA board for submitting a letter for publication. In 2015 and again recently, the board had concerns as to editorial content. With stipulations, here are the rules developed for submitting a letter to the Editor:

- 1. You must sign your name.
- 2. No name calling or defamatory remarks against any neighbor(s).
- 3. The HOA Board has the right to remove editorials that violate these rules.

Here are a few important excerpts from the Zoom board meeting on Wednesday, October 27, 2021:

- ❖ The newsletter is now accepting classified, personal ads. This means homeowners can advertise items for sale including furniture and household items, lawn equipment, holiday paraphernalia and crafts, etc. Food of any type may not be sold. The cost is \$1 per line or \$25 for one quarter page. Contact Grace Paltikian at (714) 614-3809.
- The board clarified the solar light rule addition. That rule, as it reads, applies to the front yard. You may continue to use solar/malibu, or small Christmas type lighting in the backyard. Backyard light should not overly shine into a neighbor's yard.
- It was reiterated, that homeowners living on the golf course own the slope directly behind their homes. Artistic Maintenance maintains the slopes but the homeowner is responsible for removing any unwanted, healthy pine trees. If however, a pine tree is diseased, the HOA will have it removed at no cost to the homeowner. In order to request a tree removal, you must contact Amy Dankel, Community Manager at (951) 973-7519. Artistic Maintenance is the company responsible for the removal of all trees.

Due to the Thanksgiving holiday, the next HOA board meeting will be held on Wednesday, December 1, 2021.

#### Something Lovin' from the Oven

#### **Coconut Cream Pie**

I usually bake Pumpkin and Apple Pies for Thanksgiving. But my family requested this one. (I will also make Apple Pie.)

#### Ingredients

- 1 pie crust pastry (purchased or homemade)
- 1 cup of flaked coconut
- 3 cups half-and-half
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 cup sugar
- ½ cup flour
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup whipped topping, thawed (Tru Whip has more healthy ingredients than Cool Whip)

#### Preparation

- Line pie pan with pastry. Press pastry into pan and prick with a fork.
- ➤ Bake at 425° for 9-11 min.(Watch it while it bakes and press down any swelling.)
- > Chill.
- ➤ Toast coconut on a cookie sheet at 350° stirring occasionally until golden (5-10min).
- Combine half-and-half, eggs, sugar, flour, and salt in a saucepan.
- Bring to a boil over low heat while stirring.
- Cook and stir 2 more minutes.
- Remove from heat and stir in vanilla extract and
   3/4 cup of the coconut.
- > Pour into chilled pie crust.
- > Chill for 4 hours.
- > Top with thawed topping.
- Sprinkle with remaining coconut.





#### THE GREEN THUMB CORNER.

Greetings, Green Thumbers!

November is my personal choice for the most pleasant month of the year. Nights are cool, and frost is possible.

Thin the branches of dense growing trees. Eliminate crossing branches and branches that grow towards the center of the tree. Don't leave noticeable stumps after pruning. The advice my Grandfather gave me is never leave a stub you can hang a hat on. This will allow wind to pass through the tree safely. Make sure trees are staked securely and check frequently. Remember to remove stakes when they are no longer necessary. They can grow right into the wood of your trees.

Head back fast-growing trees such as Acacia to increase trunk circumference and reduce brittleness. Note that thinning a tree is not the same as pruning. Thinning means that entire branches are selectively removed not merely cut back.

Because there might be heavy rains this winter, you might want to over-seed steep slopes with wildflowers and grasses. This can control erosion, add color to the slope and attract birds and butterflies. Mix two or three large packets of seed into a five-gallon bucket filled with sand. Hand broadcast or use a flour sifter to distribute the seeds evenly.

If we have wet days and sunless weather, be prepared for leaf and root diseases caused by standing water and prolonged dampness. There are powders and sprays available to treat these conditions. Powdery mildew may be a large problem on roses and other plants. If you notice that plants are wilting they have probably lost their roots. If possible, replant using sand or pumice.

If your lawn has crabgrass, mow it close and re-seed with mix containing primarily tall fescues.

This is a good time to look for Christmas Cacti. Pot and keep indoors or on a patio. These beautiful plants live a long time and will bloom during the holiday season.



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
