Hello everyone! I trust this newsletter finds you in good health and staying busy.

This month, I want to discuss email and/or telephone fraud. These scams are rampant and unfortunately, even intelligent, savvy people fall victim to them. The most common are Phishing scams which use impersonation and trust tactics to engage with victims in order to ask them to purchase gift cards. The attackers leverage authority and urgency in their requests and will frequently impersonate someone you might be familiar with to gain your trust. However, if you receive one of these emails, look closely at the email address of the person sending it. That address may appear as if it is coming from a business or a legitimate organization. Regrettably, these contact addresses are bogus.

If someone calls or emails you with a story and requests that you help them out by purchasing gift cards from Target, Walmart, CVS, Walgreens, etc., you can bet there is a scammer behind it. After purchase, they will ask you for the gift card numbers and PINs on the back. At that point, your money is lost.

How do you deal with a gift card scam? Keep all your gift card receipts, your emails or phone notes and report it to the police! Then, report it to the FTC at *ftc.gov/complaint*.

Protect yourself! Never, ever purchase gift cards for <u>anyone</u> who requests them via phone or email. If you are inclined to do so, make sure the request is legitimate!

Many of us have encountered individuals impersonating IRS officials – in person, over the telephone or via email. Don't get scammed by this either! The IRS initiates most contacts through regular mail delivered by the United States Postal Service. They do NOT demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer; demand that you pay taxes without the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe; threaten to bring local police, immigration officers or other lawenforcement to have you arrested for not paying and finally, they cannot revoke your driver's license, business licenses, or immigration status. If you receive a phone call, an email or a letter demanding that you contact them immediately in order to pay taxes, do not respond. It is a scam. If you do owe taxes the IRS instructs taxpayers to make payments to the "United States Treasury" and provides specific guidelines on how you can make payments at *irs.gov/payments*.

Now, Board business in a capsule. As is the case world-wide, our management company, FirstService, is having trouble getting work projects on our behalf, scheduled and completed. Jobs which would take a month to six weeks to finish now take months. Companies are short staffed, and materials are difficult to obtain. We have COVID-19 to thank for this aggravating situation. Just want you to know because if you are wondering why things are not getting done in a timely manner, this is the answer.

We are working on having an unused area by the patio cemented so that we can permanently set up a Ping Pong table and store the Corn Hole game.

Resurfacing, striping and new paint for the Pickleball courts should be completed no later than December.

The Board requested Darryl Householder to look at securing our online website. That would mean we would need a password to view the information. We will keep you posted on this issue.

And, finally, the Board approved the removal of two pine trees in the pool area due to safety issues.





THE GREEN THUMB CORNER

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Greetings, Green Thumbers!

This month we usually begin to experience autumn as the days get shorter and the nights become cool again. It's the ideal time to plant almost everything! The exception to this would be (1) tropical plants that do better if planted in the spring and (2) bare root plants which are put in the ground in January. Planting in cool weather encourages vigorous root growth during shorter, wetter days. A larger root system means a great surge of growth in the spring.

Cool season annuals include, Pansies, Violas, Lobelia, Calendula, Cineraria, Cyclamen, Delphinium, Dianthus, Evergreen Candytuft (Iberis sempervirens), flowering cabbage and flowering kale, Foxglove, Iceland Poppies, and Sweet Alyssum. Planted early, fertilized lightly, and given adequate water, they will begin to bloom before Christmas and reward you with flowers well into spring.

Consider a new vegetable or herb garden. Generally speaking, plants grown from their roots or their leaves (lettuce, cabbage, carrots, radishes, and onions) will thrive during the cool season. Divide perennials like Daylilies, Iris, Ginger, Ornamental Asparagus, and Clivia. When dividing Irises and Daylilies, look for the natural divisions between the fans of leaves and carefully saw or pry them apart. Trim the leaves to about 4 inches and replant. Divide Shasta Daisies, Gazanias, Ornamental Grasses, and Dietes, or "Fortnight Lilies." Don't shear Fortnight Lily leaves. Instead, dig and divide as you would with Iris' or Daylilies. Cutting ornamental grasses within a couple inches of the ground will prevent the messy "haystack" look.

Encourage deciduous fruit trees to dormancy by withholding fertilizer. It is not advisable to fertilize roses again until early spring.

Readjust sprinklers to conserve water. Check rain gutters for debris.

Consider broadcasting wildflower seeds. They might help in garden areas that are difficult to access or hard to maintain. Don't let these seeds dry out. The best mix of seeds includes annual flowers, perennials, and ornamental grasses.

Almost anything garden related may be done this month! Enjoy the fruits of your labor.

Chocolate Rice Krispies Treats

Ingredients

- 3 Tbsp real butter (Not tub. Not margarine)
- 4 Cups mini marshmallows
- 6 Cups Rice Krispies
- 1 Cup chocolate chips colored sprinkles (optional)

Preparation

- > Spray 9x13 pan well with cooking spray.
- Measure all remaining ingredients before starting and be prepared to use quickly.
- > Melt butter in kettle over low heat.
- Immediately add marshmallows and stir with spatula on low heat until melted and smooth.
- Immediately add Rice Krispies and fold gently to completely coat. (Rigorous motion will crush the Krispies).
- > Remove from heat.

- Cool completely.

A Series About Our Area and Local Geology

Geology and Earthquakes (Part II)

Local Geology

Moreno Valley lies within the northwestern portion of the Perris Block, within the northern portion of the Peninsular Ranges Geomorphic Province. A Geomorphic Province is just an area with unique topography and geology. There are 11 such areas in California, which you hear all the time like L.A. Basin, and Central Valley. The Peninsula Ranges Geomorphic Province generally has northwest-southeast trending mountain ranges and valleys with major right lateral strike-slip fault zones. The San Andreas on the east and the San Jacinto and Elsinore faults run through the center. OK we have an overview of this large province we live in so now let's lower our view to the Perris Block.

The Perris Block is defined by the San Jacinto fault on the east and the Elsinore fault on the west. On the other side (east) of the San Jacinto fault to the San Andreas Fault is the San Jacinto Block. So, when you drive to Beaumont you go from the Perris to the San Jacinto Block as you enter the Badlands, but you are still in the Peninsula Ranges Province. The Perris Block is underlain by granitic rocks overlain by thin to thick alluvial (water deposited) soils which can be from 20 to 2,000 feet thick. These soils are both young and older units typically sand, gravel, silts and clay. In this community these soils are young relatively thin deposits. These soils are what your house is built on and you thought it was just dirt. Some of the underlying granitic rocks of the Perris Block, which are more resistant to weathering, are visible in the small hills south of this community called Mt. Russell. So now we know that our houses are built on, soil underlain by granitic rock, but not just soil but engineered fill. What is engineered fill? Well, let's start at the beginning. Prior to the development of Mountain View, this area was a gentle sloping area which drained to a major drainage that still exists today, the golf course. When the building pads, on which your houses are built, were graded, generally the soils from the high areas were moved to the lower areas to create the configuration we have today. The soil is compacted under each structural area, prior to construction. That means every house and road sits on compacted soil. The amount varies but is sufficient to support the planned structure (road or house). All the slopes are graded to no steeper than 2 horizontal to 1 vertical. So, for every foot horizontal the slope can rise (or fall) 1 foot.

Now the above might have been boring but you'll see how it all comes into play when we talk about earthquakes and the shaking they produce.

Earthquakes

Earthquakes as we know are the result of earth materials pushing against and moving suddenly past one another. Let's get a basic understanding of the strike-slip faults in our area, and then we can see how they affect you.

Faults can be either active or inactive. Faults that have not ruptured in the last 10,000 years are considered inactive. Active faults are those on which an earthquake can be expected in the future. Unfortunately, the faults we are discussing are active faults. Faults are not very linear, and they rupture in different places and some of the time the rupture is stepped away from the previous place. So even though on a map they are a line, they are actually fault zones. These fault zones are broad areas where faulting can take place and are always being defined and redefined as we learn more about them. For example, the San Jacinto fault is part of the San Andreas Fault zone. It appears to have branched off the main San Andreas trace somewhere under the Salton Sea.; a fault zone within a fault zone. The closest fault to our community is this San Jacinto Fault Zone. The San Jacinto is approximately 2 miles to the east of us and you drive over it at some point every time you drive on Gilman Hot Springs Road on the way to Hemet. The San Jacinto fault is considered one of the most active fault systems in California. But don't start packing yet, there is a lot more information you need first.

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
