Hello everyone. This will be a short report. I had surgery on my left thumb, and I can only type with my right hand.

It's hard to believe we are coming up on Halloween. Where has the year gone? We'll blink and Christmas will be on us!

Homeowner Forum – Items on Agenda – Homeowner comments were made regarding proposed Pickleball rules and etiquette.

Pool Gate Reinforcement System for Clubhouse – Management provided three proposals for installation of an alarm system in the clubhouse and gym. The board chose a one-year contract with Bay Alarm. Installation cost is \$1,800 plus a \$90.00 monthly fee. Installation will occur as soon as possible.

The board requested proposals on heightening the wrought iron fencing around both pool gates. This process will be ongoing until proposals are completed.

<u>Old Electronic Equipment from Clubhouse</u> – The Technology Committee has requested advice on what to do with the old, outdated audio equipment that was recently replaced. An email will be sent asking if anyone in the community is interested. If there is no one, Technology will take it to recycling.

Proposed ARC Revision Approval: Holiday Decorations – The purpose of the rule change is to allow exterior decorating for all national, religious/cultural holidays or similar. The proposed rule provision allows exterior decorating to begin three (3) weeks prior to the holiday and mandatory removal within two (2) weeks following the holiday. For the purposes of this rule, a holiday is defined as a single day that is recognized as a national holiday, religious/cultural holiday or similar. If a holiday, such as Hanukkah, is a multi-day event, the timeframes are calculated based on the first day of the event. The board tabled the rule change for legal clarification.

Proposed Rules and Guidelines for Pickleball - (Background)

The currently established Pickleball group is now identified as the **Advanced Group**. These games are fast-paced and consist of players with advanced, competition-like skills. Players are highly motivated and enjoy playing highly competitive matches.

The newest group is identified as **Beginner/Intermediate Group**. It consists of individuals who would like to learn the game, who prefer a slower paced and less competitive environment, players with injuries and anyone who just wants the exercise.

Don Thomas is currently the Chair for both groups. He recently proposed some commonsense Mountain View Pickleball court guidelines/rules. This proposal will require Social Club support and final approval from the board.

Homeowner Forum Items Not on The Agenda – Maxine Dixon discussed the first meeting of the Friends of the Neighborhood committee. The turnout was excellent and useful topics were discussed. A contact form has been developed. This information will become a private database used for facilitating neighbors who need help. It's Apple Season. So, let's make Apple Crisp.



Apple Crisp with Oat Topping

Ingredients

6 apples - peeled, cored, and sliced 1½ tbsp white sugar ½ tsp cinnamon(1)

³/₄ cup flour
1 cup brown sugar
³/₄ cup old-fashioned oats
1 tsp cinnamon(2)
¹/₂ cup cold butter

Preparation

- Preheat oven to 350°.
- Toss apples with white sugar and cinnamon(1).
- Pour into a 9x9 pan.
- Mix flour, oats, brown sugar, and cinnamon(2) in a separate bowl.
- Cut in cold butter until it resembles very coarse crumbs.
- > Spread over apples and pat down gently.
- Bake until golden brown and sides are bubbling, about 40 minutes.

You may serve with ice cream, whipped cream or caramel sauce.



THE GREEN THUMB CORNER.

From the Archives by Victoria Klaas

Greetings Fellow Gardeners,

For many of us, October and November are our favorite months. We expect cooler temperatures to settle in and it heralds the coming of our second spring. This is a great month for adding color to your landscape. Plant breeders are focusing on foliage color which lasts throughout the year although, in some cases, there may be a distinct seasonal leaf change. I have included Hollies because of their brightly colored berries and their all around garden usefulness

GOLDEN LEAVED PLANTS

Golden leaved and variegated plants are garden sunshine. The leaves are "sunny" and colors run from palest ivory to deepest gold. They usually look best when mingling with green foliage. I recommend the following "sunny" plants:

SWAYNES GOLDEN ITALIAN CYPRESS – narrow and columnar with magnificent bright, golden-yellow growth. Colorful throughout the season. Full sun. GOLDEN EUONYMUS (Euonymus japonica aureo marginatus) – wide, golden yellow margins which surround a dark green center. Colorful year round. GOLDEN TRIUMPH BOXWOOD – a heat lover with high contrast, shiny green foliage and showy golden-yellow margins. Slow grower. Ideal for foundation or edging parterres. Full sun.

VARIEGATED PURPLE QUEEN BOUGAINVILLEA Sold as Golden Jackpot. Vibrant purple flowers. Dramatic contrast with the chartreuse to bright golden bordered leaves. Use in containers or as groundcover. Full sun.

SUNSATION JAPANESE BARBERRY - golden barberry. Compact form. Sports glowing golden foliage. Colorful all season. Use in mixed shrub borders. Full sun.

RIVERDENE GOLD FALSE HEATHER

Spectacular, pale lavender flowers against golden foliage. Excellent choice for rock gardens, accents in borders and mass plantings. Partial to full sun

SILVER, GRAY AND BLUE FOLIAGE

Silvery gray leaves. Works well with green leaved plants. They look magical by moonlight as if to glow in the dark.

TREE PLANTING TIME

This is a great time to consider adding a small tree for winter color or spring bloom. Plant $1/3 - \frac{1}{2}$ distance of mature tree height. Suggestions for small patio or garden trees are:

"NATCHEZ CRAPE MYRTLE "

20 feet tall x 15 wide, white flowers. Deciduous **"STELLAR PINK DOGWOOD"**

Large pink flowers, 25 feet tall and wide. Deciduous

Interesting Facts

Humans actually glow.

Bioluminescence, the strange biology that causes certain creatures to glow, is usually found at the darkest depths of the ocean where the sun's light doesn't reach. While these light-emitting animals seem otherworldly, the trait is actually pretty common-in fact, you're probably glowing right now.

According to researchers at Tohoku Institute of Technology in Japan, humans have their own bioluminescence, but at levels 1,000 times less than our eyes can detect. This subtle human light show, viewable thanks to ultra-sensitive cameras, is tied to our metabolism. Free radicals produced as part of our cell respiration interact with lipids and proteins in our bodies, and if they come in contact with a fluorescent chemical compound known as fluorophores, they can produce photons of light. This glow is mostly concentrated around our cheeks, forehead and neck, and most common during the early afternoon hours, when our metabolism is at its busiest. At such a low level, human bioluminescence likely isn't an intentional product of evolution as it is for deep-sea fish, fireflies and many other animals. And most other bioluminescent creatures rely on a compound called luciferin (Latin for "light bringer") which humans lack – for their light show. Fortunately, we have unique ways of making light that is all our own.


